


Lanivet School Attendance Policy September 2022

Introduction

Lanivet is a successful school and your child plays their part in making it so. We aim for an environment which enables and encourages all members of the community to reach for excellence. For our children to gain the greatest benefit from their education it is vital that they attend regularly and your child should be at school, on time, every day the school is open. It is very important that you make sure that your child attends regularly and this policy sets out how we will achieve this together.

Why Regular Attendance is Important Learning

Any absence affects the pattern of a child's schooling and regular absence will seriously affect their learning. Any pupil's absence disrupts teaching routines so may affect the learning of others in the same class. Ensuring your child's regular attendance at school is your legal responsibility and permitting absence from school without a good reason creates an offence in law and may result in prosecution.



Safeguarding: - Your child may be at risk of harm if they do not attend school regularly. Safeguarding the interests of each child is everyone's responsibility and within the context of this school, we will adhere to Keeping Children Safe in Education 2022:

- Preventing impairment of children's health or development.
- Ensuring that children are growing up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care.
- Taking action to enable all children have the best life chances.

Failing to attend this school on a regular basis will be considered as a safeguarding matter.

Promoting Regular Attendance

Helping to create a pattern of regular attendance is everybody's responsibility - parents, pupils and all members of school staff.

To help us all focus on this we will:

- · Regularly track and monitor attendance;
- Send individual attendance letters home at the end of each term, allowing parents to view their child's attendance record.
- Celebrate on the whole school newsletter hen a class has 100% attendance over a week,
- Put each class's attendance on their weekly class letter.
- Reward good attendance (over 95%), and those who have improved their attendance, at the end of each half term by putting their names in a school raffle where they will win a prize.
- Support families, who have been identified as having low attendance with the Education Welfare Office and Early Help Hub.

The Law relating to attendance

Section 175 of the Education Act 2002 places a duty on local authorities and governing bodies to have regard to guidance issued by the Secretary of State with regard to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and students under the age of 18.

Understanding Types of Absence

Every half-day absence from school has to be classified by the school (not by the parents), as either AUTHORISED or UNAUTHORISED. This is why information about the cause of any absence is always required, preferably in writing.

Authorised absences are mornings or afternoons away from school for a good reason like illness, medical/dental appointments which unavoidably fall in school time, emergencies or other unavoidable cause. We will ask to see the letter for hospital appointments.

Unauthorised absences are those which the school does not consider reasonable and for which no "leave" has been given. This type of absence can lead to the Local Authority using sanctions and/or legal proceedings. This includes:

- Parents/carers keeping children off school unnecessarily
- Truancy before or during the school day
- Absences which have never been properly explained
- Children who arrive at school too late to get a mark
- Shopping, looking after other children or birthdays
- Day trips and holidays in term time

Whilst any child may be off school because they are ill, sometimes they can be reluctant to attend school. Any problems with regular attendance are best sorted out between the school, the parents and the child. If your child is reluctant to attend, it is never better to cover up their absence or to give in to pressure to excuse them from attending. This gives the impression that attendance does not matter and usually make things worse.

Persistent Absenteeism (PA)

A pupil becomes a 'persistent absentee' when they miss 10% or more schooling across the school year <u>for whatever reason</u>. Absence at this level is doing considerable damage to any child's educational prospects and we need parents' fullest support and co-operation to tackle this. We monitor all absence thoroughly. Any case that is seen to have reached the PA mark or is at risk of moving towards that mark is given priority and you will be informed of this immediately. PA pupils are tracked and monitored carefully. *Termly* meetings with the Educational Welfare Officer and the senior leadership staff will ensure that all PA children's parents are supported and held to account on a regular basis.

Absence Procedures

If your child is absent you must:

- Contact us as soon as possible on the first day of absence;
- Or, you can call into school and report to reception, who will arrange for a member of staff to speak with you.

If your child is absent we will:

- Telephone you on the first day of absence if we have not heard from you;
- Invite you in to discuss the situation with our member of the senior leadership team if absences persist;
- Refer the matter to our Education Welfare Officer if attendance moves below 90% or is below 95% and a cause for concern i.e. no reasonable reason for it to be below this threshold.

Contact Details

There are times when we need to contact parents, including absence. We need to have your contact numbers and details at all times. It is therefore crucial that we hold the most up to

date details. You have a duty to notify school as soon as possible of any changes to contact details.

Education Welfare Officer

Parents are expected to contact school at an early stage and to work with the staff in resolving any problems together. This is nearly always successful. If difficulties cannot be sorted out in this way, the school may refer the child to the Education Welfare Officer (EWO) from the Local Authority.

If your child's attendance falls below 95% we will consult with our Education Welfare Officer for advice on how we should proceed with the case; in some instances, it may be necessary for the officer to meet with you and/or your child to discuss the reason for absence. Please be aware that we may not always give you prior warning of this contact, so please advise us if you would prefer contact before such action. Please be aware if your child's absences persist, these Officers can use sanctions such as Penalty Notice fines or prosecutions in the Magistrates Court to address irregular school attendance

Lateness

Poor punctuality is not acceptable. If your child misses the start of the day they can miss work and do not spend time with their class teacher getting vital information and news for the day. Late arriving pupils also disrupt lessons. This can be embarrassing for the child and can encourage absence. It is always important to start the day off positively.

Even a small amount of time missed at school repeatedly can amount to many days of learning which are missed. Each class always has an activity for the children to do when they come into the class in the morning such as reading, times table practice, spellings and handwriting therefore children are missing out on this learning and activity.

Minutes per day	How many days learning are missed
5 minutes	3.4 days learning
10 minutes	6.9 days learning
15 minutes	10.3 days learning
20 minutes	13.8 days learning
30 minutes	20.7 days learning

How we mange lateness

The school day starts at 8:45am when registration is taken, although our gates are open at 8:40am when children can come into school.

We expect your child to be in class by registration time at 8.45am; registers will be marked at that time and your child will receive a late mark if they are not present in the class.

The register will be closed 30 minutes after the school's start time. In accordance with the regulations, if your child arrives after that time they will receive a mark that shows them to be

on site, but this will not count as a present mark and it will mean they have an unauthorised absence. This may mean that you could face the possibility of a Penalty Notice if the problem persists.

If your child has a persistent late record you will be asked to meet with a member of senior staff and/or Education Welfare Officer to resolve the problem, but you can approach us at any time if you are having problems getting your child to school on time and we will look to find way to support.

Should school be unable to resolve an ongoing lateness issue we reserve the right to bring forward the close of register. This would mean that your child's lateness would be recorded as unauthorised which could result in the Education Welfare Service considering enforcement proceedings against you. **We will always inform you in writing should this action be necessary.**

Holidays in Term Time

Taking holidays in term time will affect your child's schooling as much as any other absence and we expect parents to help us by not taking children away in school time. Remember that any savings you think you may make by taking a holiday in school time are offset by the cost to your child's education.

There is no automatic entitlement in law to time off in school time to go on holiday and the government made an amendment to the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006 in September 2013 to reflect this.

Leave of absence shall not be granted unless:

- an application has been made in advance to the proprietor by a parent with whom the pupil normally resides: and
- the proprietor, or a person authorised by the proprietor in accordance with paragraph (1), considers that leave of absence should be granted due to the exceptional circumstances relating to that application.

All applications must be made in writing to the Headteacher at least 5 school days prior to the requested leave date. Absence forms are available from the school office to facilitate with this.

Where the decision is made not to authorise leave in term time, school will inform parent/carers in writing. A general guide for parent's, is leave for any holiday, activity or event that could be arranged during the annual 13-week holiday time would not be authorised.

On any occasion that school refuses a request for leave in term time, should parent/carers proceed with the leave it will be recorded as 'G' (family holiday not agreed or in excess of agreement).

Failure to notify and/or request leave of absence in term time, providing at least 5-day notice will result in all absence being recorded as 'O' (unauthorised absence not covered by any other description).

If you decide to still take your child out of school, without permission, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may refer the matter to Cornwall Council who may decide to take legal action against you. A penalty notice can be issued under Section 444A and 444B of the Education Act 1996. This carries a fine per child, per parent of £60 if

paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the penalty notice may result in Court action. Persistent absences not authorised by the school may result in a prosecution in the Magistrates Court, leading to fines up to £2,500 and/or custodial sentences. The Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court.

School targets, projects and special initiatives

The school has targets to improve attendance and your child has an important part to play in meeting these targets.

The minimum level of attendance for this school is 95% attendance and we will keep you updated regularly about progress to this level and how your child's attendance compares. Our target is to achieve better than this because we know that good attendance is the key to children fulfilling their potential.
