There are **seven areas of learning and development** that must shape educational programmes in early years settings. All areas of learning and development are important and inter-connected.

There are three Prime Areas which are particularly crucial for igniting children's curiosity and enthusiasm for learning, and for building their capacity to learn, form relationships and thrive.

At Lanivet Primary School we consider the individual needs, interests and stage of development of each child in our care. We use the EYFS to plan a challenging and enjoyable experience for each child in all the areas of learning. This means that we use a child initiated approach to learning.

Children are born with a natural desire to explore and learn, practitioners can support them in this. We do this by creating an enabling environment (both physical and emotional) and through the relationships and interactions that the children experience. Rather we remain "in the moment" with the children as they explore and investigate. We plan according to the children's needs and interests. Adults support children in various ways to help children learn. This includes interactions with children during planned and child-initiated play and activities. Adults will communicate and model language, explain, demonstrate and explore ideas, encourage, question, provide a narrative for what they are doing, facilitate and set challenges. We observe carefully and enhance the learning whenever we observe a "teachable moment". Our observations, interactions and outcomes are recorded afterwards.
